1. Intimate Partner Violence:

Inuvik Detachment is currently working with Victim Services on providing the Bystander Program to East Three Secondary School. The Detachment is also exploring if this program can be offered to adults in the community. As school is back in session, the Detachment has partnered with the East Three Elementary and Secondary School to provide ongoing engagement in relation to healthy relationships.

2. Reconciliation:

The Detachment is again participating in the Breakfast Program at East Three Elementary school each Friday. Members were also present for Books and Bannock and marched in the Truth and Reconciliation school walk on September 29th.

On September 9th, members attended the Canadian Armed Forces community BBQ at Chief Jim Koe Park.

On September 17th members led the Terry Fox Run down Mackenzie Road. Members also attended the community BBQ held after the event.

On September 29th members participated in both the East Three Elementary and Secondary School marches to honour Truth and Reconciliation day.

On September 30th members also walked in the community march to the Midnight Sun Complex to start Truth and Reconciliation day. S/Sgt. Aubin played goalie during the youth carnival (see picture below).

3. Road Safety:

The Detachment conducted two proactive traffic enforcement programs this month (check stops). Due to the great proactive work of detachment members, four impaired driving by alcohol charges were laid.

A Criminal Code charge of driving while prohibited was also laid due to a police-initiated traffic stop of an ATV on Mackenzie Road. Two other tickets for offences under the *all*-





terrain vehicle act were issued this month.

Eight tickets for offences under the *Motor vehicle Act* were issued as well as multiple warnings. Members will continue to focus on impaired and dangerous driving. Community members are encouraged to report these offences by calling 911.

On September 2nd, 2023 a citizen of Inuvik reported a possible impaired driver. Detachment members attempted to stop the vehicle but the driver fled. For safety purposes, members did not pursue as they had identified the driver when they attempted to stop him. The 19-year-old male driver was later located and arrested. He is facing charges under the Criminal Code including flight from police, dangerous operation of a motor vehicle and taking a motor vehicle without consent.

4. Drugs and Alcohol:

Multiple proactive foot patrols (see photo below) were completed downtown this month with several police generated liquor act offence investigations initiated resulting in 6 bottles of liquor disposed of.

On September 16th, 2023 police stopped a vehicle on suspicion that vehicle occupants were smoking cannabis. The vehicle was subsequently searched and members located 17 grams of illegal cannabis along with open liquor and drug paraphernalia. The driver was charged under the *Cannabis Act for* consuming cannabis in a vehicle (see photo below).

Notable Occurrences for the Month:

On September 3rd, 2023 the Inuvik Detachment received a report of a missing person from the Inuvik Hospital. The Detachment including Police Dog Services, a helicopter, drones using heat sensors and local volunteers searched for the male. He was eventually located, unharmed three days later. The Detachment would like to thank the Town of Inuvik and the Fire Department for their assistance during the search. The Detachment would also like to thank the citizens of Inuvik for all their cooperation.



TOPIC

AWARDING OF THE MIDNIGHT SUN COMPLEX CONCESSION CONTRACT

BACKGROUND

A request for proposals was advertised locally via postings, website, and social media. The competition closed on September 30, 2023.

One proposal was received and was reviewed by Michael Trabysh - SAO, and Mayor Clarence Wood.

The town has been without an MSC concession for a few years now and the users of the MSC complex have expressed dissatisfaction with lack of options for warm food and drink. This will fill a large gap in the community for options for food service and delivery not only in the MSC but in the community.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Revenue from renting the space for \$1500 per month

STRATEGIC PLAN OR PRIORITIES CHART IMPLICATIONS

This item is not on the strategic priorities chart.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS OR OPERATIONAL IMPACTS

Council has given its approval for \$100,000.00 to be allocated towards concession equipment as part of the 2023 capital budget. These funds will be used to enhance the MSC concession and the town will retain ownership of the equipment. The lessee will be responsible for the maintenance of the equipment

TOPIC

<u>Third Reading</u> of By-Law 2718/LND/23 Sale of Land - Carmichael Sub-division

BACKGROUND

The Town of Inuvik is in receipt of an "Offer to Purchase Municipal Land" from the Inuvialuit Regional Corpration. The property was surveyed and registered with land titles and appears on the current Certified Assessment Roll.

- The total purchase price is \$2,517,570.00
- The Zoning is R1 –Residental Low
- The Town of Inuvik has title to this property

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Accepting this offer results in additional cash inflows consisting of property taxes, utility revenue and reduced interest and principal on debt. The net cash inflow savings of accepting this offer is estimated at \$ 1,160,409 (in year five). Further, the debt servicing breaks even in year nine.

Not accepting the offer results in servicing debt of \$5.5 Million and could impact sales activity drastically reducing the number of lots sold. The worst-case scenario could realize a net cash outflow loss of \$1,586,818. A detailed cash flow model is tabled below and will be presented to Committee of the Whole on September 25, 2023.

A BY-LAW OF THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF INUVIK IN THE NORTHWEST TERRITORIES TO DISPOSE OF REAL PROPERTY BY WAY OF SALE.

WHEREAS pursuant to the *Cities, Towns and Villages Act,* S.N.W.T. 2003, C.22, Sections 54, 55 and Land Administration By-law 2708/LND/23.

AND WHEREAS the land is not required for municipal purposes;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the Municipal Corporation in the Northwest Territories, at a duly constituted session, enacts as follows:
